The demands of work life keep **Mark** busy. He travelled to Chad for two weeks in September to carry out maintenance on the aircraft there. We continue to pray for a permanent Chief Engineer for the Chad programme.

At the end of November he travelled up to Juba, S Sudan to disassemble a damaged propeller and have meetings with various staff there. We do now have an aircraft engineer permanently based in Juba which makes it a lot simpler to troubleshoot problems and keep the aircraft maintained.

Abby was actually able to join Mark on his trip to Juba. The plan was for her to experience the day to day life of her friends in our South Sudan team, go to Juba Christian Academy with them, and live on the Juba MAF Compound. Unfortunately, the day after flying up on the MAF shuttle she developed a fever which persisted for the whole week and put a damper on the whole trip....We are thankful she did not get really sick and for wonderful colleagues who looked after her so Mark could still get his work done.
