"Marking Out Foundations"

For any self-confessed 'geek' like me, playing with virtual reality headsets as part of my job is a dream come true. It comes with a serious purpose though, to enable engineering specialists to connect with maintenance staff across the world in real time and share safety critical data.

There are obvious risks from the developing remote technology scene, the major one being an increasing human disconnect and a waning ability to communicate on a deep and meaningful level (as we have been designed to do!).

As Manager of Technical Training & Innovation, I must help balance the introduction of new technologies into the aircraft maintenance environment by providing clear boundaries on how and when they must or must not be used.

Otherwise the very real danger for our engineers, especially of the younger generation, is that we are sucked into the comfort of relying on remote communication technology, rather than the far more important competence of building healthy, interdependant relationships in person.

Getting the balance right helps us mark out the foundations for a healthy family.

When I haven't been playing with new toys, June has been busy with meetings with an aircraft maintenance training organisation who take our MAF engineering apprentices through their theory training, based in Perth, Scotland.

I've met with the UK Civil Aviation Authority in Gatwick, to learn and discuss how we can structure MAF maintenance training in such a way as to build a firm foundation for both MAF engineers in the future, but also look at ways of positively influencing the maintenance training in countries we serve.

Two of our MAF core values are Partnership and Impact. Working hard to build good relationships with African maintenance training providers and the aviation authorities, means we are in a position to serve and support the development of training and safety standards in local aviation industries.
